This is one of the longest-running computing conferences that presents a forum for research in human-computer interaction and ergonomics with an emphasis on the theories underpinning cognitive processes and functions, reporting on experimental work, and on the ergonomics of psychological and behavioural level interactions, appliances and the use of information technology which is designed to fit with human capabilities.

It's such an important forum, designed to give space for ideas, reflection and discussion for the community. We wanted to seek your help to reinvigorate the conference for Belfast in 2019, as well as for future years. The cognitive ergonomics active research community is still relatively small in number but includes some of the best-regarded research groups, people and cultures in the world.

We also have an arrangement with the respected journal, Behaviour and Information Technology, that selected papers from each conference will be published in the journal.

We are asking you to reach out to your research group members, colleagues and friends, and encourage submission of world-class research in cognitive ergonomics and in ergonomics/human factors to ECCE for the 22 February 2019 submission deadline.

Consider submissions across the board: long papers, short papers, workshops ideas, demos concepts, panel suggestions, and especially important, great PhD researchers to sign up to the Doctoral Consortium on 10th September 2019.

The cognitive ergonomics community has a great opportunity to increase the number of significant research papers in the conference, thereby increasing interest in the conference and attracting researchers to attend. Also making it a great go-to conference for PhDs and more establish researchers alike with a programme designed to let ideas be heard, explained in more detail and fully discussed in a lively interaction.

The organisers have invited some great keynotes for the conference. Nadia Berthouze, UCL Interaction Centre, Alan Dix Computational Foundry, Swansea and John McCarthy, UCC Cork Neuroscience Centre have all agreed to speak.
